## What is this project about?

- The City of Courtenay is developing guidelines to help design City playgrounds to be more fun, inclusive, and accessible for everyone in the community.
- The City will be reviewing leading-edge playground design and industry best practices to inform our approach to playground design.
- The Let's Play, Courtenay! project is a chance for residents of all ages to help shape Courtenay's playgrounds, including:
  - What materials to use
  - Which activities to include in a play area
  - Where to put plants and furnishings
  - How to make playgrounds fun and accessible for everyone

## Who is the city engaging with on this project?

• Kids, grandparents, and everyone in between are invited to provide feedback on new playground design standards, The City is also consulting many community partners about the new playground standards.

## When with the survey close?

• The survey is open until **February 16**. A second survey will come this spring for the community to review the draft playground design standards. The final version of the guidelines is expected later in the spring.

## Why is the City working on this project?

- Playgrounds are community gathering spaces as well as active play places. As playground facilities age over time, they all eventually need to be replaced.
- The new playground design standards will be a set of steps the City will follow to make sure Courtenay's playgrounds are designed and upgraded to best meet our changing community's needs.
- We want to ensure our playground inventory reflects the diverse needs and interests of Courtenay residents and provide unique, community oriented, and inclusive play environments.
- This project is a 2024-2026 strategic priority for Council.



# How will the information be used?

- Planners, designers, and builders will use these guidelines when designing new playgrounds or upgrading existing play areas in our City's parks.
- Woodcote Park playground is a top priority for replacement in 2024, and would be the first playground replacement using the updated playground design standards.
- The City of Courtenay has 19 playgrounds and one fitness park in its current inventory. The standards will inform the replacement of these playgrounds as they come up for replacement.
- The Playground Design Standards only apply to City of Courtenay playgrounds, they do not apply to School District 71 playgrounds or playgrounds on private property.
- Courtenay's capital budget includes \$1.036 million for playground replacements in 2024 and 2025, which includes \$1 million from the <u>Growing Communities Fund</u>.
