#### **PURPOSE:**

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The City has been providing and receiving mutual aid service through the Comox Valley Fire and Rescue Services Agreement (Mutual Aid Agreement) for decades.

The Mutual Aid Agreement has been beneficial to all parties involved over the years. This agreement allows us to handle those rare incidents that would exceed our resource limitations.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

On May 10<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the Comox Valley Fire and Rescue Services Agreement moved to a month to month basis until such time of extension or termination.

Staff considers this agreement to be a straightforward renewal of a longstanding fire service agreement, and are recommending approval.

There are no additional financial impacts relating to renewal of the agreement, and cost recovery provisions are included in the agreement.

#### WHEREAS:

- A. sections 176 and 745 of the Local Government Act and section 23 of the Community Charter empowers local governments and improvement districts to enter into mutual aid agreements with other jurisdictions;
- B. the Comox Valley Regional District provides fire protection services through bylaws as shown in attachment "B";
- C. there would be a benefit in the form of improved safety and fire protection for area residences from such an agreement between the local authorities that are parties to this agreement.

NOW THEREFORE THIS AGREEMENT WITNESSES the Parties, in consideration of the agreements, premises and mutual promises contained in the agreement and other valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, agreed with one another as follows:

#### 1.0 DEFINITIONS

In this agreement:

- 1.1. "Area of Jurisdiction" means the territorial area over which each party has legal authority to provide emergency services.
- 1.2. "Consumables" includes but is not limited to foam and absorbents and does not include water.
- 1.3. "Emergency" includes but is not limited to confined space rescue, high-angle rescue, HAZMAT, water rescue and fire suppression.
- 1.4. "Emergency Resources" means persons and equipment designated by a Providing Department for the purpose of providing assistance to a Requesting Department, all or a portion of which may be made available to a Requesting Department to assist.
- 1.5. "Officer in Charge" means the Officer in Charge of a fire department at the time of a request.
- 1.6. "Party" means any Party to this agreement.
- 1.7. "Providing Department" means a fire department providing assistance under this agreement.
- 1.8. "Requesting Department" means any fire department requesting assistance under this agreement.

#### 2.0 PREAMBLE

Regardless of the size of a jurisdiction there may be times when that jurisdiction may require additional resources. A large fire, or other emergency, can quickly exhaust the resources of any single jurisdiction. Large fires may require additional manpower, equipment and supplies. Other emergencies may require specialized equipment or other resources.

The increasing complexity of emergency response services makes it virtually impossible for any one single jurisdiction to be able to provide adequate resources for every potential scenario they may face within their jurisdiction. These complex emergencies often require "specialized" resources that may not be available from within the jurisdiction in which they occur. Large or multiple fires may also quickly exhaust the resources of a single jurisdiction. In these cases it may be necessary and beneficial to request resources from a neighbouring jurisdiction. This agreement may, over time, allow greater fire department specialization yielding more efficient overall use of resources at a reduced cost.

Emergency response frequently requires a rapid deployment of resources. This agreement is intended to minimize delay in securing additional or specialized resources from a number of potential fire departments.

The Requesting Department has certain powers and authorities within its own Area of Jurisdiction. In order to provide an efficient response the intent of this agreement is that the members of the Providing Department will have the same powers and authorities as the Requesting Department in relation to controlling or acting at an Emergency.

The local governments that are signatories to this agreement have a broad range of resources and expertise within their respective fire departments. In order to ensure fairness to all taxpayers, it is intended that equipment, firefighters and supplies be provided to a Requesting Department on a cost recovery basis.

#### 3.0 TERM

- 3.1 The term of this agreement shall be for five (5) years commencing on May 9, 2013 and ending on May 10, 2018. (the "Term")
- 3.2 Any Party may terminate its participation in the agreement with thirty (30) days written notice to all other parties.
- 3.3 This agreement, upon expiry, shall remain in effect on a month to month basis unless a party wishing to terminate its participation provides written notice. Such notice to be provided to all other parties to the agreement.

#### 4.0 REQUESTING ASSISTANCE

- 4.1 Where the Officer in Charge determines that an Emergency exists that is beyond the capabilities of his/her resources he/she may request additional Emergency Resources from an Officer in Charge representing the fire department of any of the Parties to this agreement.
- 4.2 A department who receives a request for Emergency Resources may, at their sole discretion determine if they can fulfill the request. If the requested department determines it is unable to fulfill the request, that decision will be communicated to the Requesting Department. Nothing in this agreement shall be interpreted as requiring any Party or their fire department to supply Emergency Resources to another Party or their fire department.
- 4.3 The Officer in Charge of the Requesting Department shall immediately release from active assistance, a Providing Department if the Providing Department's Emergency Resources are required in their own Area of Jurisdiction.
- A Requesting Department shall advise a Providing Department in a timely manner that their Emergency Resources are no longer required and shall not typically require the Providing Department for clean-up.
- 4.5 The Requesting Department's Officer in Charge has the authority to command and control the Emergency Resources of the Providing Department until such time as the Requesting Department notifies the Providing Department that their Emergency Resources are no longer required.

#### 5.0 INDEMNIFICATION

- A Party requesting assistance under this agreement hereby releases a Party providing assistance, its Providing Department, elected officials, officers, employees, contractors and volunteers from and against all claims, demands, expenses, costs, actions, suits, damages, and liabilities of every kind arising between the Parties for failure of the Providing Department to respond to a request from a Requesting Department.
- A Party requesting assistance under this agreement agrees and does hereby indemnify and save harmless a Party providing assistance, it's Providing Department, it's officers, employees, contractors and volunteers from and against all claims, demands, expenses, costs, actions, suits, damages, and liabilities of every kind for damage or injury to person or property, including death, directly or indirectly arising from the Providing Department's response, assistance, conduct and activity under this agreement except where such liability is caused by the malicious or grossly negligent misconduct of the Providing Department, its officials, employees, contractors and volunteers.

#### 6.0 COST RECOVERY

- 6.1 Where a Providing Department provides Emergency Resources to a Requesting Department, the Requesting Department agrees to reimburse the Providing Department as requested for those Emergency Resources utilized in accordance with the following:
  - a. as per Attachment 'A' titled "Reimbursement rates Emergency Resources" as amended from time to time;
  - b. replacement or costs of all Consumables used by the Requesting Department related to the request; and
  - c. costs of repairing damage to or loss of any portable equipment, tools, hose, ladders, clothing or any other such items.
- 6.2 Parties will reconcile their use of this agreement, with regards to section 6.1(a) at the end of each calendar year. Parties would be invoiced before January 10 of each year and payment is expected within 120 days.
- 6.3 All Parties agree that in regards to item 6.1(b) and 6.1(c), replacement of Consumables and damage or loss, any amounts owning would be paid on demand.
- Any Party may, at their sole discretion, decide not to invoice any other Party for any of the above items identified in Section 6.
- 6.5 If the Providing Department intends to issue an invoice, it must notify the Requesting Department of this intent, in writing, within 30 days of the Emergency assistance.

#### 7.0 RECORD KEEPING

7.1 Both the Requesting Department and the Providing Department shall maintain records of such assistance for the purpose of cost recovery. These records shall be maintained for two years and shall be made available to the other Parties and fire chiefs involved in a request for assistance.

#### 8.0 DISPUTE RESOLUTION

8.1 Should a dispute arise regarding annual reconciliation, invoicing or any other matter involving this agreement, a three-member panel of Parties' fire chiefs which may include the manager of fire services of the CVRD, who are not directly involved with the dispute, will adjudicate it. Their decision will be binding and based on information obtained from both parties and the content of this agreement.

#### 9.0 RESOURCE LIST

9.1 The Comox Valley Fire Chiefs Association will maintain a list of resources of each local fire department. This list will be updated annually and made available to all Parties and fire chiefs.

#### 10.0 SPECIALIZED EQUIPMENT

10.1 The Parties to this agreement agree that it is beneficial to have different fire departments develop differing specialized services. Examples of these specialized services include but are not limited to: confined space rescue, high-angle rescue, HAZMAT, water rescue, and aerial equipment. However; nothing in this agreement limits any Party from developing any of their own specialized resources or compels any Party to develop such resources.

#### 11.0 INSURANCE

- 11.1 Each Party shall maintain insurance coverage on its own fire fighting equipment.
- 11.2 Each Party shall maintain WorkSafeBC coverage and other required coverage for the personnel of its own Fire Department.
- 11.3 Each Party shall maintain liability insurance coverage.

#### 12.0 REPLACEMENT OF MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS

12.1 Each Party to this agreement agrees to appropriately terminate any other pre-existing mutual aid agreement that is in place with any other Party to this agreement and agrees that this agreement will replace any pre-existing mutual aid agreements.

#### 13.0 AMENDMENT

13.1 This agreement may only be amended by written agreement of the Parties in the form of a formal amending agreement.

#### 14.0 COUNTERPARTS

14.1 This agreement may be signed in counterparts, which together shall constitute one agreement. If this agreement is signed in counterparts, no signatory hereto shall be bound until all parties named below have duly executed, or caused to be duly executed, a counterpart of this agreement.

Subject: 2018 Water Capital Budget Amendment - 20th Street Water Main

#### **PURPOSE:**

The purpose of this report is for Council to approve an amendment to the 2018 Water Capital Plan to include renewal of approximately 125 lineal meters of aged AC water main on 20<sup>th</sup> Street to accommodate a new development that includes a new sidewalk and storm line. The cost of this project is 130,000.

#### **CAO RECOMMENDATIONS:**

THAT based on the May 28, 2018 Staff Report "2018 Water Capital Budget Amendment - 20<sup>th</sup> Street Water Main" Council approve OPTION 1 and approve the renewal of 125 lineal meters of water main along 20<sup>th</sup> Street, at an estimated cost of \$130,000.

That the 2018 budget be amended so this amount can be taken from the 2018 Buckstone water booster pump station capital project which is \$250,000.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

20<sup>th</sup> Street, between Cumberland Road and Willemar Avenue, has had a number of multi-family developments over the past decade. Recently, a significant multi-family development has occurred at the corner of 20<sup>th</sup> Street and Cumberland Road called the Creekside Development. During the recent development review which occurred after the 2018 Water Budget deliberations, it was noted by Asset Management Technical Services that a portion of existing AC water main (150mm) fronting the Creekside Multifamily Development on 20<sup>th</sup> Street was to remain in place and not be removed as part of the overall project.

The original justification to not replace this portion of water main was made based on the development's requirement to upgrade a section of water main along Cumberland Road. This was required in order to provide adequate fire flows to the development site specifically and no other upgrades were considered necessary at that time.

#### **DISCUSSION**

For the reasons outlined below time is of the essence in seeking Council approval to proceed with this capital renewal project.

Since the original review for this development, Asset Management and our understanding of our Water System and Fire Flows have matured significantly. Through the lens our of our recently completed inhouse water model and condition assessments of water mains in the area, it was identified that two other multifamily sites on 20<sup>th</sup> Street, adjacent to the new development do not meet the required fire flows. This is due to the undersized existing 150mm water main on 20<sup>th</sup> Street that is unable to provide sufficient fire flows. This is a potentially significant liability for the City.

Furthermore, if this section of undersized AC water main was to remain in place, it would be at risk of failure due to the heavy construction and road profile changes necessary for the development. Two vertical realignments of the existing AC water main would be required in order to accommodate the new storm main installation (currently open ditch) within the road allowance. These realignments will most likely leak in the near future.

Additionally, the water main fronting this development is horizontally aligned within the existing ditch and is very shallow. As part of the Creekside Development a new sidewalk is planned to be constructed directly over top of the existing AC water main. This is not an ideal scenario for an aged AC water main as the lack of required cover and construction compaction, once a new sidewalk is placed over top, will surely compromise the water main. Potential water breaks and concerns from the Island Health Engineer have prompted Asset Management Technical Services and the City Development Engineer to recommend replacement of this section of water main.

Asset Management Technical Services has been in communication with the Developer's Contractor and have secured a quote to perform this work on the City's behalf. Pricing is competitive at approximately 850 dollars per lineal meter as the contractor is already on site, mobilized and installing assets as part of the Development.

The renewal of this section of water main will allow the Creekside Development to not only effectively finish the required sidewalk installation but provide sufficient fire flows necessary for all existing multifamily sites fronting 20<sup>th</sup> Street.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

The cost of this project is 130,000.

In the approved 2018 Water Capital budget is a Project called Buckstone Booster Station. This project is to rectify mechanical deficiencies in the booster station and was originally budgeted at \$250,000. Public Works Services along with our Consulting Engineers has determined that the overall project cost will be significantly less than first anticipated, due to an alternative solution that will be further explored and outlined to Council in the future.

The 130,000 cost for the 20<sup>th</sup> Street water main upgrade can be completed utilizing these remaining funds.

#### **ASSET MANAGEMENT IMPLICATIONS:**

Due to the age and size differential of the remaining portion of 150mm AC water main along 20<sup>th</sup> Street to Willemar Avenue will be placed on the Water Register for inclusion in the 2019 Water Capital Budget.


