SHEENA CAMPBELL	<ul> <li>Sheena Campbell discussed the following items:</li> <li>Noticed Food Policy Council is missing. An important topic and player in local economic development (food sales, access, distribution).</li> </ul>
TOM DISHLEVOY	<ul> <li>Tom Dishlevoy discussed the following items:</li> <li>Want to see a stronger stance on floodplain retreat, more on rainwater harvesting infrastructure, need a section on development certainty.</li> <li>Lot sizes in land use section play a formative role in many of the goals of the plan. Need to spend more time considering that factor.</li> <li>Dates in the document need to be better aligned (e.g. many target dates listed) and need commitment to interim targets. Don't forget, most people don't start acting until the deadline.</li> <li>Planning for growth of parks system needed, similarly to other municipal infrastructure.</li> </ul>
